News from the DAR

In our August Newsletter there was listing of the **Top 10 Libraries for Genealogical Research**. They were all public libraries. But there are other libraries or research centers in the US that should not be missed. Two of the top are the Family History Library in Salt Lake, Utah and the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C.

The Nation's Capital has several top places for genealogists to visit besides the Library of Congress. If you are in Washington, D.C., you should visit the National Archives and the DAR Library. Below is some new information from the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) about their library taken directly from Eric Grundset, Library Director:

"After many decades of having an entrance fee, the DAR Library in Washington, D. C. has dropped the fee effective immediately. We want to encourage usage by more people who were sometimes deterred by having to pay a fee to use the library."

Editor: Obviously, free is a good thing! Although I am sure they would welcome donations to help keep their collections available for future researchers. Below is some history and information on the DAR Library:

The DAR Library was founded in 1896 as a collection of genealogical and historical publications for the use of staff genealogists verifying application papers for the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Shortly after 1900 the growing collection was opened to the public and has remained so ever since. The DAR Library is free to all visitors.

The Library is one of the nation's premier genealogical research centers based on the uniqueness of its sources. The Library's book collection numbers some 225,000 volumes, the cataloging records for which constitute this catalog. Approximately 3,000 new titles enter the Library each year, many of which are works printed in limited quantities.

Many thousands of volumes of genealogical compilations, record abstracts, and other materials are available only at the DAR Library. DAR members and the public have contributed these sources, building a collection of great research depth covering all periods of American history. The period of the American Revolution is naturally a major focal point, but the colonial era and the nineteenth century receive detailed coverage as well. Through the efforts of local DAR members and chapters nationwide almost 20,000 volumes of Genealogical Records Committee Reports have entered the Library and constitute a unique source for family histories, cemetery record transcriptions, and Bible records.
