We will meet on Tuesday evening, January 27th at 6:30 p.m. for a new topic entitled: "Techniques & Strategies for More Effective Online Searching." Our speaker will be Dr. Bernard N. Meisner.

As more and more genealogical material becomes available through the Internet it has become essential to make efficient searches to find the relevant information about your ancestors. One must not only know where to look for the information, but how to find it.

This presentation will cover how to determine what information is available, where it is located, and how to use search tools such as filters, wildcards, relationships, complementary data sources, and tailored search engines to improve the likelihood of finding what you need.

Editor: In the December newsletter I expanded on a series about the greatest genealogical resources or libraries in the US. I had to interrupt that series this month with big news from the two largest public libraries with genealogical collections in Tarrant County. Read on for more news from **Fort Worth Library** and the **Arlington Public Library**.

Fort Worth Library:

The Fort Worth Library is happy to inform you that the <u>Tarrant County Tax Rolls</u> have been digitized and made available for research.

Tarrant County, named after General Edward H. Tarrant, was founded in 1849 when it was carved out of

neighboring Navarro County. In 1850, the first Tarrant County Tax Assessment was conducted by the Navarro County Tax Assessor, W.B. McCabe, since Tarrant County had not yet been officially organized. Later that same year, John A. Hust was elected as Tarrant County's first tax assessor. This collection consists of scanned microfilm images of the original tax ledgers from 1850-1880. A tax assessment for Tarrant County was conducted annually. In early years, some of the tax assessments were as few as six pages, but as the 1880s approached, the ledgers spanned over 200 pages.

Arlington Public Library:

George W. Hawkes Central Library of Arlington closed its doors December 23, 2014.

The Library at 101 E. Abram, stood in the heart of downtown Arlington for 40 years. Private developers plan to raze the library in February 2015 to make way for a \$43 million mixed-use development featuring apartments, retail, restaurants, offices and shops in its place. Across the street, the city will build a larger library just north of City Hall that is expected to open by 2017.


A comprehensive study found that the existing 63,000 square-foot concrete and steel building needs millions of dollars in repairs, is no longer large enough and can't be expanded.

The **Genealogy Collection** is expected to be moved temporarily to the **Northeast Branch Library**, 1905 Brown Blvd., until the new library opens. Other library services will be distributed among the other branches.
