The January Meeting Program

Throughout our membership year we advance our genealogy knowledge through various programs and hearing subject matter expert speakers. The January meeting program turns the tables. Our program will be sourced from "US" the members. Come to the meeting ready to share about an heirloom item, or an aspect from your family history. Share with the members about your research accomplishments or your "brick walls". Sharing these stumbling blocks may open a new

angle to pursue. Your story is likely to inspire other members to a renewed interest in some aspect of genealogy. One of our Society officers will speak first to get the program and discussions started. Keep your presentation to 5 minutes or less so more members have a chance to speak.

The December program, *Picturing Family History: Identifying Preserving and Sharing Old Photos*, featured Ann McKee as the speaker. Ann inherited 106 unidentified family photos, dating from the 1860s. Within four years she had identified the people in 86 of those. Ann shared her techniques to help you do the same with your "mystery" photos. Ann's talk focused on scanning those "mystery" photos and sharing widely, resources for identification, and the identification process. Her program included a four-page handout. Copies of Ann's handout will be available on the browsing table at the January meeting.

Happy New Year!

This is a time when many pause to reflect on the past year and make plans for improving some aspect of their lives in the coming year. It is not uncommon for organizations to do something similar. In the year of 2017, there was quite a bit of growth and learning for our organization.

Our membership roster has grown throughout the year, both in the number of family and individual memberships. Attendance at meetings has been fantastic, with a variety of different guests in attendance each month, much of which is owed to the variety of speakers and topics presented at each meeting.

As an organization we have welcomed new individuals into leadership roles, updated our constitution and by-laws, and furthered our stated purpose. We continue to promote the study of genealogy through our monthly speaker program, provide ongoing assistance to the Arlington Public Library in obtaining and preserving genealogical books, microforms, and other records of historical interest.

We continue to maintain our Section 501 (c) (3) status of the current Internal Revenue Code through our annual reporting and pursuit of our educational and literary purposes.

We continue to source and acquire research media for housing in the Arlington Public Library, which was begun in 1972. With the collection relocation, while the new George Hawkes Library is under construction, AGS assisted library staff with organization, catalog referencing and inventory management to ensure an accurate listing of the collection, reduction of duplicate items, and condition evaluation of the text media on hand.

We have donated funds to the Arlington Public Library to purchase Microfilm scanner/reader equipment as well as funds to honor our long-time member and benefactor, Alfred A. Howard (1932 - 2012).

We will continue to advance our mission in the coming year as we look forward to the new George Hawkes library opening in the coming year. It is an

exciting time for our society and we look forward to a great 2018!

Committee Reports

Collection Development, Mary Ann Conrad, Chair, and the committee have had a busy few months selecting and purchasing the balance of reference media to be donated to the APL with 2017 funds. The AGS book purchase amount was \$1,474.03 for 42 books averaging about \$35.00 per book. An additional 13 books were donated directly to the APL by various AGS members and friends. If you are in need of, or are aware of good genealogy reference books, please share your information with Mary Ann Conrad.

Membership, Jan Penland, Chair, reports we have 17 family memberships, (34 persons), and 41 individual members. Also, one institutional member (Allen County Library). A total of 76 members. Of those, 28 family and individual members have

renewed. We had a nice increase in membership in 2017! The committee encourages members to pay their 2018 dues prior to or during our January meeting. During 2017 the term of membership was changed to January through December, and all 2017 society membership terms were extended from September to the end of the 2017 Calendar year. Your Society dues remain at \$15.00 for an individual and \$20.00 for a family. General Genealogy Information

Are you searching Texas seaport arrivals? The Texas Seaport Museum has compiled the nation's only computerized listing of immigrants to Galveston, Texas. The museum's immigration exhibit features text and historic photographs illustrating Galveston's role in immigration history and the major organized immigration movements of the 19th and 20th Centuries. Can't visit the museum? The Galveston immigration database is available online to search for information taken from ships' passenger manifests, [TSMLINK](#). In all, the names of more than 130,000 passengers from the period 1846-1948 have been entered. The database lists only those who first disembarked in Texas. Are the records complete? An unknown percentage of the records are missing; there are very few entries between 1871 and 1894. Need more detail after finding that elusive ancestor? The Galveston County District Clerk provides a sophisticated web-based portal for immigration

Beginning December 13th, 2017, patrons visiting FamilySearch.org will see a prompt to register for a free FamilySearch account or to sign in to their existing account to continue enjoying all the free expanded benefits FamilySearch has to offer. Since its launch in 1999, FamilySearch has added millions of users, billions of various historical records. It offers fun, new features like Family Tree Memories, mobile apps, digital books, and dynamic help. In order to accommodate continued growth of these and future free services, FamilySearch must assure all its partners that its content is offered in a safe and secure online environment. Patrons creating free accounts and then using them fulfills that obligation.

Patron sign in will also enable FamilySearch to satisfy the need for user authentication. This authentication can deliver rich, personalized discovery, collaboration, and Help experiences. Simply put, signed-in visitors can access more searchable content and enjoy more personalized services.

“A large percentage of our current site visitors are not benefiting from much of what FamilySearch has to offer because they don't realize the need to simply sign in with their free account to do so,” said Steve Rockwood, FamilySearch CEO. “They are basically arriving in the parking lot but not coming inside for the main event,” he said about website visitors who do not sign in.

FamilySearch is committed to patron privacy and does not share personal account information with any third party without a patron's consent.

Friday March 28 Watson News

A newly made grave was added to our cemetery (West Fork) last Saturday, Mrs. Cook was buried. Our deepest sympathy goes out to her loved ones especially her daughter Mrs. Annie Yankee, who has many friends in this community. Mrs. Cook lived with Mrs. Yankee at the time of her death.

Friday March 28 Radio Funeral at El Paso.

Rev. H. D. Tucker conducted the first radio funeral at El Paso on Saturday March 22, for Geo. Casten, a high school student and member of his church who died with spinal meningitis. Because of the contagious character of the disease, only members of the immediate family, who were exposed to the disease, were allowed in the mortuary chapel. The funeral took place with the minister broadcasting the sermon from the church, the family of the deceased being with the body at the mortuary chapel seated around a radio and friends gathered at the high school auditorium around another radio. Rev. H. D. Tucker who preached the funeral was formerly of Arlington and is a son of our own townsmen, G. A. Tucker, having been reared here. His friends and relatives rejoice to know that his pastorate is one of the largest churches in El Paso, is meeting with success this being his third year to be returned there. He has made wonderful progress in his work, and has endeared himself to his people.

April 4, DEATH OF MRS. MATTIE L. JAMES

Mrs. Mattie L. James passed away at her home two miles south of town Tuesday morning and was buried in Arlington cemetery Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Rev. Ike T. Sidebottom officiating. Mrs. James was 70 years of age and was sick for some time before her death. She leaves a sister Mrs. Frank Thomas and step son W. O. James and many friends to mourn her death.

Friday April 4 JOHNSON STATION

Our community was saddened Tuesday evening at six o'clock when Mrs. S. O. James passed from this life to a better world. Mrs. James lay ill for some two or three weeks and suffered but was always patient and endured her sufferings to the end when God took her from this world of sorrow and pain.

Mrs. James was a sister to Mrs. Frank Thomas and we extend to all her loved ones our sympathy.

Friday April 4 PANTEGO NEWS

There was very deep sadness passed over the entire community last Thursday when Mrs. Leslie Darden passed away to a land of perfect rest. She was at the Baptist Sanitarium of Fort Worth where she had been very low for eight days.

Mrs. Darden was Miss Mamie Mundon of Sulphur Springs Texas. Born July 22, 1902. Died March 27, 1930. She leaves her husband Leslie Darden and two children, Hazen age 10 and C. L. (Jack) age 7. The family has only lived here some three months but all who knew her loved her as a sister. She lived an ideal life before us and we expect to see her again where there is no sorrow or good-byes.
