We will end the "meeting year" at our June program with a "Brick Walls" session where we will try to help one another through a stumbling block in our own research.

community room. The committee got an update briefing from, Mark Dellenbaugh, APL Genealogy Librarian, about the microform equipment purchases funded by an AGS donation. A small balance is available for additional equipment enhancements. The committee agreed to touch screen monitor upgrades and dedicated Chromebook computers for the local history and genealogy room at the soon to open downtown library.

Nominating, Sylvia Hoad, Chair. The nominating committee was activated at the last board meeting. Nominating forms were distributed at the March regular meeting and will be distributed at future meetings. Election of Officers is scheduled for the June members meeting.

General Genealogy Information

When I say April 1st is WORLD BACK-UP DAY you might say "April Fool". All kidding aside, yes there is such a thing as World Backup Day, on March 31st. Friends don't let friends go without a backup. So, give this action some thought. One small accident or failure could destroy all the important files you care about. Develop a backup plan and stay with it. You'll be glad you did.

A short list of vital information commonly found in obituaries and death notices: Name, place, and year of birth and date of death. Name and age of spouse. Facts about the decedent's career. Names of children, where they lived, and their position in the family's birth order. Names of the countries and communities where they lived and when. Details on the longevity of parents and grandparents. Lists of ancestors and descendants, often by generation. Date and place of the funeral and burial including name of the cemetery.

Online Genealogy Information

The MyHeritage mobile app for Android and for iOS (iPad, iPhone, and iPod Touch) users has been enhanced with a scanner feature that can use your smartphone's high-resolution camera for scanning old photographs and documents directly into your family site on MyHeritage. MyHeritage has a great online interaction system among users via internal to the software email. The MyHeritage mobile app now offers that same comprehensive email-based messaging feature to communicate with other

members of MyHeritage regarding topics of genealogical collaboration.

Hundreds of thousands of new historical records were made available during the week 26 March on FamilySearch, Access to databases from around the world, including California, Cape Verde, El Salvador, England, Nicaragua, Paraguay, South Africa, and Uruguay.

This next bit of info comes from Dick Eastman, long time genealogy blogger and author, who wrote on 21 March. "A new website, *African American Civil War Soldiers*, may be one of the most important history-related web sites launched so far this year. The new website will crowd-source the transcription of the military records of roughly 200,000 African Americans soldiers who fought for their freedom in the American Civil War. These records are of great interest to historians and genealogists, since they contain detailed biographic information on individual Union Army soldiers, most of whom were slaves at the start of the Civil War. Until now these records have been locked away in the National Archives, accessible only to a select few researchers." March 2018 Program Summary

Kelvin L. Meyers, gave an information packed presentation along with a detailed handout titled "*Plowing Through the Land Records to Find Your Ancestor*." Kelvin's talk had an attention getting introduction, "Because Americans were so 'land minded' over ¾ of all males who lived to maturity, well into the 19th century, owned land. Because this is true, land records exist from the beginning of the first permanent settlements in America- frequently one of the few identifying records from this early period. A quality unique to land records is that the older they are the more genealogical data there may be to obtain from that record." One of our members shared on Facebook that Kelvin's presentation and

handout gave him the means to locate more than a dozen deeds from 1700s North Carolina records.

From THE ARLINGTON JOURNAL

The year is 1930, a “local news” republished feature with selected articles copied from *THE ARLINGTON JOURNAL* by Will Keller, with permission, APL call # GEN REF TX.5 K 1925 – 1933 v.3.

Friday May 2, DEATH OF MRS. MILLER, Last Saturday afternoon Mrs. Pete Miller, age 72, who lives on Cooper and Main, took sick with heart trouble and passed away in a few hours. Mr. and Mrs. Miller moved here from Dallas about two years ago. Mr. Miller is practically an invalid. An old friend of his has come to make his home with him. Mrs. Miller was buried in Calvary Cemetery in Dallas. Father Diamond, a catholic priest, had charge of the services. Mrs. Wilson, who is a sister

of Mrs. Miller attended the funeral, leaving Tuesday for her home in Chicago, Ill.

Friday May 2, Last week at the Tate Dairy, south of town, which is owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. E. O. Peck, found that their dog was suffering with hydrophobia. They killed it and sent its head to the laboratory at Terrell and found it to be infected with rabies. The dog had bitten some of the family and employees, so Mr. and Mrs. E. O. Peck, Milburn Newton and sister, Sam Hand and Cuba Porter began taking treatment at once, and at present no ill effects have shown up.

Friday May 2, GRACE CHAPEL, We wish to express our sympathy to the friends and relatives of Drew Coats of Irvin, who passed on to the home of rest last Saturday morning. He and his family lived here for many years. He had a great many friends and relatives in this community.

Friday May 2, Mrs. C. R. Daniels and daughter, Peggy, attended the funeral of her grandfather, Rev. J. D. Kennedy, who passed away at Cleburne last Friday.

Friday May 9, DEATH OF G. T. ROWDEN, Wednesday afternoon the death angel visited the home of G. T. Rowden and took from it his spirit. He who had been only sick for a short time. Mr. Rowden was born April 8, 1855, and died May 7th, 1930, his age being 75 years. He was married to Miss Louda Sims of Lewis Co., Tenn. Nov. 7, 1876. Four sons were born to them as follows: John A., George M., Whitt and Thomas Rowden. He professed religion while quite young and joined the Methodist church, and (at) the time of his death was a member of the Webb Methodist church. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. S. M. Bennett assisted by Rev. Reddy of the Webb Baptist church. Interment at Arlington cemetery.

Friday May 9, (editorial) Close Your Mufflers, Thoughtlessness probably causes more inconvenience and hardships than any other one thing indulged in by young people. Complaints are coming in to us about Arlington boys cutting open their mufflers or causing their car to backfire with a loud report which brings residents to the door to see what the disturbance is about, generally thinking there is a fire.

Such thoughtlessness on the part of some Arlington boys is causing real suffering to people who are sick and those who are old that cannot go to sleep after being awakened by such noise at night. Probably no harm is meant by this attempt to have a good time, but it is caused nevertheless and our city marshal informs us it will be stopped with fines of \$17.30 just as fast as the offenders are caught.

Trouble, inconvenience and money may be saved by taking notice of this intention on the part of our city officials and we believe the practice will cease without further complaint.

Friday May 9, New broadcasting station near grapevine, opens Sat. The new 50-watt (should be 50,000 watt) broadcasting station WFAA located close to Grapevine, which is the latest thing in superpowered stations, will be formally opened Saturday night with an all-night program which will be well worth tuning in on.

This is the station where Paul Barnes and Clarence Collins are employed as operators, a write-up of which was published in the Journal several weeks ago. Their many friends in Arlington are proud of them and their work as well as the fine station which is placed under their care.

This event will mark the formal opening of the South's first superpower broadcasting plant. It is one of the eight 50-watt (should be 50,000 watt) transmitters in America and represents a capital investment of more than a quarter of a million dollars.

The voices of many prominent men and women will be heard in a ten-hour broadcasting ceremony. A special hour's program, complimentary to the new power station, will be sent from New York City by the National Broadcasting company's artists. The station's own staff, which composes a galaxy of well-known stars, will give the best in radio.

Among the visitors scheduled to be in Dallas are Governor Moody, Dr. Daniel A. Poling, New York City, well-known radio speaker; Josephus Daniels, former Secretary of the Navy, and Tom Kennedy, voice of R.K.O., New York City. Motion and sound pictures will be made during the celebration.

Radio listeners of America will find WFAA on 800 kilocycles, or near the center of every dial.

And from a local historical perspective . . .

Winter 1888: In spite of the manifold warnings of

physicians, in spite of the fact that cupid's bow is changed; and in spite of all the contemptuous and sarcastic remarks which are constantly appearing in the papers, gum-chewing in this country is rapidly on the increase. (FW Gazette)

Winter 1888: A Wells Fargo & Co. detective announced today that Black Bart, who robbed 31 Texas stagecoaches, several of them locally, had been located in Northern California, robbing stages again. The detectives have hopes of soon catching him, but the prospect is dubious, as he has eluded them for more than ten years. (FW Gazette).

Fall 1929: The contract for 6000 seats in the grandstand at Arlington Downs has been let to the American Seating Company . . . This will raise the capacity of the grandstand at the track to 10,000 persons. (FW Press)
