General Genealogy Information

Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year celebrations are just around the corner. Take advantage of those family social gatherings to share your family history research findings. Doing so may open new sources of family history and genealogy information.

The 400th anniversary of the Mayflower Pilgrims landing falls in 2020. Family history blogger, Tamura Jones, has been doing extensive research on the Mayflower Pilgrims including genealogy work on the so called 'missing pilgrim, Moses Fletcher. In part she writes, Quote: "The Mayflower colony wasn't the first or largest colony in America, but it is arguably the most significant one. The Mayflower story has become more than history, it has become part of American culture and identity.

The Mayflower Compact, voluntar[ily] signed by all adult males, is considered a predecessor of the American Constitution. Their 1621 thanksgiving service, often called the First Thanksgiving, has roots in the Leiden, Netherlands, 3 October celebrations, which started with a thanksgiving on 3 October 1574, in the Pieterskerk in Leiden. Online Genealogy Information

Online genealogy resources continue to grow at a furious pace. For example, the Dick Eastman blog reports on 31 Oct., that FamilySearch.org expanded its **free** online archives [the previous week] with 145,000 new historical records from Germany, Chile, Italy, and the United States (Texas, West Virginia, and Western States Marriage Index.). FamilySearch added the new indexed records to existing collections. The numerous online genealogy sites are in a continuous update mode so it makes sense to go back and repeat search efforts that came up blank in the past. Some of the online genealogy sites offer a feature that alerts the user when archive updates are likely to produce a hit for searches you ran in the past.

As seen in a recent issue of the Pittsburg Post-Gazette, a cartoon, [Honey], you're signing-up for ancestry.com? [Yes, dear] maybe one of us is related to the mega-millions winner.

Researching a Texas family lineage invariably leads to the Texas General Land Office. After finding local tax records and deed records, your voyage of discovery about ancestral lands is about to shift into "high" gear. At the GLO the recently updated Land/Lease Mapping Viewer is amazing. Don't be intimidated by the sophistication of the online mapping viewer. The three-day Texas State Genealogical Society 2018 Family History Conference, *Journey through Generations*, was held the first weekend of November in San Antonio, TX. The conference featured 56 lectures, 4 two-hour workshops, an exhibit hall with many exhibits and vendors, and the awards banquet speaker, Andrew Carroll, Founding Director of the Center for American War Letters.

Also, AHS first floor renovations are nearing completion. Fielder House remains closed for tours; however, the AHS business offices are now open.

Arlington Heritage Memorial Grounds (AHMG)

The Arlington Historical Society's ongoing initiative to Preserve Arlington's Historic Cemeteries on West Arkansas Lane continues to gain momentum and donations. Plans for the three cemeteries North of Arkansas Lane and East of Johnson creek include improved fencing, security, gravestone restoration, and an interactive tour. The AHMG Project is a consortium consisting of Tarrant County and City of Arlington leaders and concerned citizens who wish to transform a

neglected and endangered historical site into a powerful place of honor and education.

A research committee under the leadership of Dawn Youngblood, Tarrant County Historic Preservation and Archives Officer, is actively researching who is buried there and how much we can learn about each deceased person. Steven Brown, AGS president, along with AGS members Dorothy Rencurrel and Pete Jacobs are volunteers from our Society helping the research committee. The “genealogical” research is ongoing and far from complete. If you are interested in becoming an AHMG research volunteer contact Steven Brown or Pete Jacobs. Any direct descendants or relatives of ancestors interred in the three historic cemeteries are encouraged to contact the research committee to share what they know about their people.

From THE ARLINGTON JOURNAL

Arlington's home town newspaper for 98 years [1897-1995]. The year is 1930, in this “local news” republished feature with selected articles copied from Will Keller's book, *THE ARLINGTON JOURNAL*, with permission, APL call # GEN REF TX.5 K 1925 – 1933 v.3.

Friday July 4, MRS. MATTHEWS, Mrs. Emma Mathews, age 78, died at the Eastern Star Home last Saturday afternoon at 5 p.m. Mrs. Matthews has been in poor health for several months, but the last two weeks has been growing worse. She went to sleep to awaken in heaven, for she was one true Christian woman. She was left to raise a large family of children all alone, and she did her part well. Rev. J. H. Stewart, officiated, and after his service, Dallas Chapter No. 1 of Dallas took charge of the body. She was laid to rest in the Masonic Cemetery Sunday afternoon at 6 o'clock.

Friday July 4, KILLED by Interurban, as we go to press word was received in Arlington that a Mr. Yarbrough, who lives east of here, was killed by an interurban in Oak Cliff at Dallas Thursday. We are unable to learn his initials or details of the accident.

Friday July 4, A sad message was received from Mrs. F. R. Wallace at Waco, announcing the death of her only sister, Mrs. Annie Taylor. Mrs. Taylor was a fine Christian character, and to know her was to love her.

Friday July 18,

TRY SMILING

When the weather suits you not,

Try smiling.

When your coffee isn't hot,

And from a local historical perspective . . .

November 1841: Jonathan Bird and his party arrived on the first at Calloway Lake (originally a smaller, natural lake). 5 miles east of the junction of Village Creek and the West Fork. They built a blockhouse and several log shelters within a log pallisade. The settlement consisted of about 40 people and lasted only 3 months. *Joyner, Arista. Arlington, Texas: Birthplace of the Metroplex, 1976.*

November 1893: Arlington's first public well began to flow today, spouting water 30 feet high. For a time, the mineral water was thought fit only for horses to drink. As much as 175,000 gallons of water per day ran down Center Street until a few years later the water was piped to a dozen homes (at a cost of one dollar per month) for stock and gardens . A drinking fountain was not established at the well until 1900. In 1907 Dr. Collins piped the water to a turkish bath. Soon after the reputation of the water caused it to be bottled and shipped all over the country. (Arlington Journal, 1948)

Nov. 1902: "As Mrs. Tom Rudd and daughter-in-law Mrs. Ed Rudd drove their buggy through Arlington today, the horse ran away [and] overturned the buggy, throwing the ladies out, bruising them considerably." (Arlington Journal).
