General Genealogy Information

This year, 2019, marks a return to copyright expiration on an annual basis. At midnight on New Year's Eve, all works first published in the United States during 1923 will enter the public domain. It has been 21 years since the last mass expiration of copyright in the U.S. Read more in a Smithsonian magazine article by, Glenn Fleishman, go to copyright - LINK

Popular author, Dani Shapiro, memoirist and novelist has another potential best seller. Shapiro's latest book will be of interest to genealogists. It is titled, *Inheritance: a memoir of genealogy, paternity, and love.* The title is a link to the author's books in the APL catalog. The publication date is January 2019, and the APL has three hardbound books on order. So, to pique your interest a bit more, I quote in part from a January 2019 *BookPage* interview by, Alice Cary, [Shapiro says] "All my life I had known there was a secret. What I had not known: the secret was me."

Online Genealogy Information

Most genealogists have ancestors with military service or ancestors who are war veterans, and may have memorials to those ancestors on Fold3. Those who did not or could not serve registered for the draft. The WWII U.S. draft registration card image collection on Fold3 has added four new states to the company's collection of U.S. WWII draft

registration card images. The collection now contains cards from Montana, Kansas, Pennsylvania, and Oregon. There were seven draft registration periods in the United States for World War II service. The first and second draft registration was held in 1940 and 1941 before the United States had entered the war. My source: J. Ashcroft and Dick Eastmann blogs.

In 2016, Family Tree Magazine, listed Randy Majors' cartography tools for historical maps and ancestor search work in their ranking of the top 101 best websites for genealogy. Before discovering Randy Majors mapping tools, your editor used various printed sources, an atlas or two, and various websites to sort out boundaries over time. Now my go to "tool" for determining the correct place names for the place's ancestors lived is randymajors.com. Randy's free mapping tools overlay Google Maps with historical county boundary lines. This key feature is handy because county boundaries change over time. Randy's website is a big time saver as you make sure you're looking in the right county for the place and historical years you're researching. To give Randy Majors' map interpretation website a try go to rmajors - LINK. Randy regularly introduces improvements, and has gone beyond the USA to seven more countries [United Kingdom, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, Canada, Mexico and Switzerland].

Arlington Historical Society

The Arlington Heritage Memorial Grounds (AHMG), located in the 600 block of W. Arkansas Lane, is owned and maintained by the Arlington Historical Society (AHS). Although the AHMG is a one entity place, it is actually comprised of three independently established cemeteries: Middleton Tate Johnson Family Cemetery, the Mill Branch Cemetery, and the Colored Cemetery.

The small 1.8 acres site serves as a monument to the history of Arlington and Tarrant County with burials spanning more than a hundred years from the 1850s to the 1950s.

Although the Arlington Heritage Memorial Grounds is no longer an active burial site, leaders from the Arlington Historical Society, the City of Arlington, and Tarrant County are working together to restore this location to its important place in the history of Arlington.

"This historic burial ground has been plagued by neglect, vandalism and security problems off and on from the beginning," said Geraldine Mills, Arlington Historical Society Executive Director. From THE ARLINGTON JOURNAL

Arlington's home town newspaper for 98 years [1897-1995]. The year is 1930, in this "local news" republished feature with selected articles copied from Will Keller's book, *THE ARLINGTON JOURNAL*, with permission, APL call # GEN REF TX.5 K 1925 – 1933 v.3.

Friday, August 15, 1930, L. L. Wootton, Jr. gets thrill from an airplane ride over the city. Early Saturday morning we could hear the buzz of a large airplane as it swept over the city, and more especially, coming very low in the neighborhood of the L. L. Wootton home on West Abram, which circled over the home several times. The thought came to the neighbors as to why they, were being celebrated in that way, but came to find out that L. L. Wootton, Jr. and Miss Shirley Robinson of Houston, a cousin of the Wootten's had driven over to Dallas, and Capt. Connell an expert pilot took them for a joy ride, to Fort Worth and return. This was indeed a thrill to Junior and we feel sure it was to Miss Robinson.

And from a local historical perspective . . .

February 1884: A traveler reported today that the town of Arlington is still improving, and is destined at some future day to be an inland town of considerable notoriety. These people are shrewd and hospitable in no small degree. In school matters they exhibit a commendable zeal for the general diffusion of knowledge among youths of their city. (Fort Worth Gazette)

March 1905: Joe Ivy opened the Arlington Hotel today: "I will run an up-to-date hotel and give the best service ever. \$2.00 a day.and meals at 25 cents. (Arlington Journal)
