When saddle-weary cowboys arrived in Fort Worth in the late 1800s and early 1900s, they went looking for food, drink and feminine companionship. They found all that -- and more -- in a Cowtown neighborhood called Hell's Half-Acre. It was a place of saloons, dance halls and women of commercial virtue. And it was commanded by a retinue of madams, tough women who ran



the brothels and exercised power in Fort Worth politics and economics. A TCU historian and doctoral candidate, Jessica Webb, has researched the history of Fort Worth's red-light district from the 1870s to the 1920s and will lecture on that bawdy era at the Billy W. Sills Center for the Archives. Her

talk will focus on the life and legends of the famous Madams who ran Hell's Half-Acre..
