May Monthly Meeting

Subject: Weapons of the War Between the States Speaker: Russell Birkner First Sergeant of the 36th Texas Cavalry (A local Civil War Re-enacting group).

Russell is a Civil War re-enactor who knows personally what it is like to carry those weapons. He'll showed us period piece weapons and other gear and explain how each was used. An interesting fact is that the uniforms were usually wool even in the heat of the summer. As a result, there were many instances of heat stroke and deaths. Most of the weapons were smooth bore which limited the range significantly. Later in the war, rifles were introduced, and these had a very long range.

Yes, we were still going strong when we had to leave about 8 P. M.

Project IOGENE

This UNT project is aimed at improving the user interface to the Portal to Texas History at the UNT Library. I am the representative of the FWGS on the advisory board for this project.

I reported the beginning of this project last summer. On Saturday, May 30, I attended a conference at the Willis Library on the UNT Campus which was a progress report on this project. I have found that the new user interface is a significant improvement over the existing interface.

One problem that I had in my very brief tour on Friday evening concerns Childress County where I and both of my parents were born. Both parents and all four grandparents are buried in the Childress Cemetery. Alas, when I selected the option to find newspapers in the county, I instead found a very large listing for a newspaper in Tulia (which isn't close by). I understand that the reason is that the Portal has no copies of the newspaper in Childress; hence it finds the newspaper that it does have which is closest to Childress. This and similar problems will doubtless be resolved eventually. My suspicion is that there are no newspaper archives from Childress County. The newspaper in question would be the Childress Index.

The scheduled roll out of the new interface is June 20, 2009. The project manager has requested that a few of our members attend a meeting to discuss this improvement. She is willing to come to Fort Worth for this purpose.

TREVIA WOOSTER BEVERLY Tejas Publications & Research Houston, Texas

Trevia Wooster Beverly is a professional genealogist; amateur historian; cemetery preservationist; speaker and workshop leader; writer and publisher; book reviewer. She is listed in 1981 and 1990 editions of Meyer & Filby's Who's Who in Genealogy & Heraldry, in Who's Who of American Women, 1981-82, and Notable Women of Texas 1984-1985.

Her interest in genealogy began with a 9th grade English project and she has since traced her own paternal line and that of her husband to England in the early 1600s, and her mother's Acadian family from France to Canada, back to France and into Louisiana in 1785.

Trevia has presented numerous lectures and workshops to both genealogical and lineage groups on a variety of topics on both the local and state level. She serves as the Assistant Coordinator and Program Chair of the multi-day summer genealogy conference at Angelina College, Lufkin, Texas. Appointed to the Harris County Historical Commission in 1995; currently serves as Secretary. Served on the Mayor's Task Force for Houston History. She served as Host Chairman for the National Genealogical Society's annual Conference in the States, Houston, 1994. A member of the Society from 1975, she received their Distinguished Service Award, 1994.

A native of Harris County, Texas, she is married to Murphy T. Beverly with one daughter, two grandchildren and two greatgrandchildren.
