John Wylie, a full-time professional genealogist since 1990; he serves the Texas State Genealogical Society as Vice President; the Association of Professional Genealogists as national secretary from 2006 through 2009; the National Genealogical Society as a member of the GenTech Advisory Committee since 2002 and the Grand Prairie Genealogical Society as past-president and current Library Liaison. A founder of Gentech he served on the team that developed the *GenTech Genealogical Data Model*. In twenty years John has authored more than 25 articles in publications including *Stirpes*, *Digital Genealogist, National Genealogical Society Quarterly* and *Genealogical Computing*. He has lectured at over a dozen national conferences and at state and local seminars in 29 states. He co-authored the NGS special publication *Indexing Family Histories* and wrote the *How to Cite Sources* tutorial used on Ancestry for eleven years. He was the 2004 recipient of the DGS Lloyd Bockstruck Distinguished Service Award.

It also provides the full text of modern U.S. newspaper obituaries and enhanced Social Security Death Index (SSDI) records. Significantly, each of America's GenealogyBank's five historical or modern collections is updated with new content on a daily, weekly or monthly basis.

America's Obituaries and the Social Security Death Index

America's GenealogyBank offers the full text of more than 22 million obituaries and death notices published between 1977 and the present day in over 800 newspapers from all 50 states. Genealogists can cross-reference these obituaries with over 78 million Social Security Death Index (SSDI) records, which have been enhanced with exact age and city, county and state information that genealogists can easily copy and save to their files.

Digital facsimiles of printed items from Historical Books

The Historical Books collection includes digitized versions of all available books, pamphlets and other publications printed in America before 1819, with coverage expanding to 1900. This makes it easy to search rare, fragile genealogies, local histories, cards, charts and other printed items online.

A variety of essential records from Historical Documents

The Historical Documents collection features the entire American State Papers (1789-1838) and all items of genealogical value—over 40% of the publications—from the U.S. Congressional Serial Set (1817-1980). Genealogists can research government and military records, casualty lists, widows' claims, military pension requests, bounty land warrant actions, dispute resolutions, land grant applications, orphans' petitions and much more.
