Anthropodermic Bibliopegy is the practice of binding books with HUMAN SKIN!

"During the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, the practice became known among physicians, who used human skin to bind anatomy books. The skin was usually taken from cadavers, but was sometimes taken from criminals. One common form was to take the skin of criminals who were sentenced to death and use it to bind the records of the criminal's trial. This was seen as a punishment that would last even after death." Unfortunately the process destroys DNA so we will never know if they were our ancestors!

Lloyd de Witt Bockstruck

Mr. Bockstruck is a nationally known lecturer on numerous genealogical and historical topics.

He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Greenville College in 1967 (cum laude), a Master of Arts degree in European History from Southern Illinois University in 1969, and a Master of Science degree in Library Science from The University of Illinois in 1973.

Mr. Bockstruck was the former supervisor of the Genealogy Section at the Dallas Public Library before his retirement. He joined the Library in 1973.

He has also taught in the SMU School of Continuing Education and at Samford University Institute of Genealogical and Historical Research from 1974 to present. He was the first recipient of the IGHR's Outstanding Alumni Award.

In 1999, he was named the first recipient of the Filby Prize for Genealogical Librarianship. He received the National Genealogical Society Award of Merit in 1982 and named a Fellow of NGS in 1992. He has been featured in Who's Who in America.

His publications include: Virginia's Colonial Soldiers, Genealogical Research in Texas, Revolutionary War Bounty Land Grants Awarded by State Governmental and Naval Pensioners in United States 1800-1851.




Parking
