HISTORY

FREEDMAN'S BANK? FREEDMAN'S BUREAU?

Did you know these were actually two different sets of records? The names are confusing, but

they are separate databases. For African Americans, these are two of the most useful records to research ancestors after the Civil War.

FREEDMAN'S BANK is actually the **Freedman's Savings and Trust Company**. This institution was set up after the Civil War to help African American soldiers and freed slaves bank their finances. It only lasted a decade with its failure in 1874. Records exist on Family Search, Heritage Quest, & Ancestry from 1864-1871.

In NYC a few European immigrants deposited too. Records can establish full names, maiden names, residency, & some familial relationships.

FREEDMAN'S BUREAU was actually The Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen, & Abandoned Lands established on 3 March 1865 by Congressional Act and administered by the War Department for benefit of freed slaves, refugees, and also tracks abandoned or seized lands during the War. These were not financial records *per se*, but dealt with health/hospital matters, clothing, relief, even court records, letters, and census type information. These can be a wealth of information for displaced families after freedom. Ancestry has many of the state bureaus ranging 1863-1878. NARA has them on microfilm too.

U.S. Colored Troops Military Service Records, 1863-1865These are compiled service records for Union volunteers.
Lincoln did not approve use of Black troops until 1863 and by the close of the war there were about 175 regiments composed of 178,000 African-American troops. Ancestry & NARA have these records. Fold3 has some too.

US Slave Narratives, 1936-1938 This was a US WPA project. It consists of 2,300 first-person accounts of slavery and 500 black and white photographs! Available on Ancestry, Library of Congress & various other web sites. (Do a Google Search) Many recordings exist as well as printed copies.


