A column about some basics of DNA began in December and will run for several future issues.

Let's dig a little deeper into the BIG 3 DNA tests this month. And let's define some terms you hear all the time when people are discussing their recent DNA results.

First—when you get your results you most likely will have 2 parts: Your DNA profile and your haplogroup. So-what is a haplogroup? (Here is where everyone starts to wish they had paid more attention in Science class.) A haplogroup is a designation of individual groups of people (or closely related groups of people) within the full spectrum of all humans. If you think of the human race as a giant family tree, then a haplogroup is one branch. All the descendants on that branch originated from one individual. Now we are not talking your genealogy—we are talking near the dawn of time. 12,000 to 30,000 to 50,000 years ago—too far back for finding genealogy. But we might be talking about your roots of origin. Africa, Asia, Europe, etc.

Your haplogroup designation will be a combination of Alpha-numeric such as **B 4'5** or **B 5a1a**. Now here is where you need to know some Civilization history and Migration history. As an example, the B 5a1a is a haplogroup of Native American ancestry (usually found in SW America or N Mexico.) But **B 4'5** is an Asian haplogroup found in SE Asia. Don't forget it is known that early humans left Asia over the Bering Land Bridge when sea levels were lower and made their way through Alaska, Canada and North America, Central America and eventually South America. Native Americans descend from Asian ancestors and their closely related haplogroups show it. Migrations through history have scattered haplogroup members around the world.

You can find haplogroup reports in the Y DNA or the mtDNA Tests. That is because you have paternal haplogroups and maternal haplogroups. Men who inherit their father's Y chromosome can be placed in a paternal haplogroup. Women cannot, but can find this from a close male's test. Remember last issue we called mtDNA "deep genealogy" because it traces so back into your past. Your "mother to mother to mother" mitochondrial DNA is the only DNA outside of the nucleus of cells. It does not mutate as quickly and therefore carries down for stretches of thousands of years. Your maternal haplogroup is shared with all people who shared your same female ancestor from the time it altered. And remember, men do inherit their mother's

mtdna, so large groups of descendants are placed into this one haplogroup.

Y chromosomes do recombine with X chromosomes so Y DNA does alter through time. It is estimated that Y is 95% unchanged from your ancestral male, so your Y haplogroup is fairly accurate. But alter, recombine, or mutate--DNA will, given the right circumstances and time. That is where the other letters and numbers come in when designating your haplogroup. These are the places where your DNA altered or mutated from another branch on that giant family tree.

Second—some test results on your deep ancestry of origin will vary from test to test or company to company. This is sometimes to be expected, if your autosomal varies. Autosomal is your nearer genealogy and may not reflect your origins of 20,000 years or so. Differing companies may be working with different testing sample groups. And that brings up a point. Is your ethnicity or origin 100% true or correct? Not exactly. This is a relatively young science so far. As more people around the world get tested, our knowledge base will grow and expand. Results may evolve over time. A larger sample base will always be better.

So Y chromosomes and mtDNA are a small portion of your total DNA and ancestry. Most haplogroups started thousands of years ago and show your "ancient" ancestry. And you will find this in the Y DNA test and the mtDNA test. The Autosomal test will be better to show your closer genealogy because it is a larger portion of your total DNA. Autosomal DNA changes with each successive generation allowing you to get back five to ten generations. These results may well match better with recorded history and what you believe about your own ancestry. Your ancient haplogroups may indicate origins that you don't identify with as they are so far beyond your experiences and beliefs.


