### **DNA Tests in the News Again**

Your Editor recently caught a fascinating story on a CBS news show. It involved two families, one Jewish and one Christian. Tom, raised Christian, decided to take a DNA test just for fun. He thought it odd his test came back heavily eastern European Jew and did not match his sister. Susan, from a family with Jewish roots found Tom on Ancestry.com after her DNA results indicated Tom should be a first cousin. She could not believe it as she knew all her first cousins. She contacted Tom and found he was born in Dearborn, MI. She went back through her family ties and realized that one of her first cousins, Herb, (who was now deceased) had been born in Dearborn too at almost the same time as Tom. With further inspection the two boys were born in the same hospital within hours of each other, so both mothers and infants were in the same maternity ward at the same time. The babies were born within hours of each other on December 7, 1941—Pearl Harbor Day. It is now thought that in all the horror and confusion of that day (that day that lives in infamy), the babies were switched. They believe it must have been accidental. The good news is that now Tom has two families, his "life family" and his biological family. Tom now has a brother and sister he did not know. And a new birthday. He was actually born a few hours into December 8th. But he's decided to keep his "old" birthday of December 7, 1941.

DNA once again reveals the truth. And with the rising popularity of these tests, the number of these stories is increasing too. So much so that "Help" groups are forming to deal with the emotions and trauma of finding unexpected lineages. One such group NPE Friends Fellowship estimates that currently 5-10 % of all DNA home testing results in unexpected parentage. Not only are support groups forming, but 23 & Me has begun sensitivity training for their phone employees who must deal with customers who call back for help with distressing news. Most of the DNA companies have added articles or helpful information to their websites to help customers deal with these unexpected results.

Recently, FWGS hosted speaker Sheila Randolph who had encountered an NPE in her family tree and spoke about it to us. NPE is often referred to as a Non-Paternal Event or Not Parent Expected. If the event is

several generations removed like Sheila's was, it is easier to deal with, maybe even humorous. If it is *your* parents who lied or were lied to, it can be devasting!

When I was a little girl my father used to quote an old saying: "Locks are only for honest people." I did not understand for a long time what he meant. But I guess he was saying we can never be totally secure. If a thief wants your possessions, he will find a way to steal them-he will break a lock. I think it is that way with our secrets too. Secrets will be found out; the truth is better. DNA is proving that now. I think back for hundreds and hundreds of years—maybe to the beginning of time—of our lineages and records. Is our genealogy foolproof? No! If some parents in 1766 took an orphan child into their home to raise as their own, we probably don't know it. There are myriad scenarios that have happened over time that have affected us all. If our paperwork does not match up today, DNA just may steer us right.

### Remember, it is called GENEalogy for a good reason!


