#### **2020: CENSUS TIME AGAIN**

#### APRIL 1<sup>ST</sup> IS OFFICIAL CENSUS DAY

Genealogists would be nowhere without their Census (and their senses too!) Maybe that should be put on a t-shirt! But it is true. From the beginning of our fledgling nation in 1790 and now in our new decade 2020, the US government conducts a population census every ten years. We all know the benefits of a census: the counting of our citizens, (especially males of an age to be drafted into militia service.) We know it provides for our governmental representation in Congress. It directs where monies should be spent, where growth is, it provides a snapshot of our citizenry including gender, ethnicity and sometimes citizenship or country of origin. There has sometimes been controversy around census questions and this year the controversy revolves around a citizenship question. I think genealogists prefer to skip the politics and opt for as much information as they can glean from these valuable documents. Perhaps our descendants will thank us.

Will our descendants see future censuses? We do know that census information is kept confidential for at least 72 years. A quick look at the calendar shows that the 1950 census should be available to release in 2022! That's just around the corner in two short years! Nothing much has been said or released on this topic. We know it will be a monumental task. And we know that while technology has advanced greatly, there will still be great problems. The problems are that the technology that was once used to analyze and keep the census, are technologies that are no longer in use today. We may have great trouble just getting to the census. Genealogists will be watching and listening. **RESPOND TO 2020 CENSUS** 

For now: Watch your mailbox for your official census invitation in mid-March. The days of the census riders on horseback and walking farm to farm are gone. Or maybe not. The census takers in Alaska have already been riding snowmobiles and airplanes as they head to remote islands and areas covered in snow. All **you** have to do is answer the questions and mail it back. **OR** now you can respond online or by phone. This census will be historic for this first-time attempt to have 3 ways to respond (two by technology!) **The questions you**  **answer should be true as of April 1<sup>st</sup>.** Good genealogists know you should check out the official date for every census you use. [Sometimes a person is listed on the census, even though he was already dead. But the census asks, was he living in this house on April 1? (but he could be dead on April 15 and still be listed).]

#### **2020 CENSUS TIMELINE**

#### 2020

**January 21**: The U.S. Census Bureau starts counting the population in remote Alaska. The count officially begins in the rural Alaskan village of Toksook Bay.

**March 12 - 20:** Households will begin receiving official Census Bureau mail with detailed information on how to respond to the 2020 Census online, by phone, or by mail.

March 30 - April 1: The Census Bureau will count people who are experiencing homelessness over these three days. As part of this process, the Census Bureau counts people in shelters, at soup kitchens and mobile food vans, on the streets, and at non-sheltered, outdoor locations such as tent encampments.

April 1: Census Day is observed nationwide. By this date, every home will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census. Once the invitation arrives, you should respond for your home in one of three ways: online, by phone, or by mail. When you respond to the census, you'll tell the Census Bureau where you live as of April 1, 2020.

**April:** Census takers will begin visiting college students who live on campus, people living in senior centers, and others who live among large groups of people. Census takers also begin conducting quality check interviews to help ensure an accurate count.

**May - July:** Census takers will begin visiting homes that haven't responded to the 2020 Census to help make sure everyone is counted.

**December**: The Census Bureau will deliver apportionment counts to the President and Congress as required by law.

#### 2021

**March 31:** By this date, the Census Bureau will send redistricting counts to states. This information is used to redraw legislative districts based on population changes.

Here are some of the efforts completed in 2019:

January - September: The Census Bureau opened more than 200 area census offices across the country. These offices support and manage the census takers who work all over the country to conduct the census.

**August - October**: Census takers visited areas that have experienced a lot of change and growth to ensure that the Census Bureau's address list is up to date. This process is called address canvassing, and it helps to ensure that everyone receives an invitation to participate in the census.

#### **CENSUS SCAMS IN THE NEWS**

There was a recent article in the *Fort Worth Star Telegram* about scams that have already begun around the public's duty to answer the upcoming census questions. By now, you may know that your census will arrive in the mail and you are required to answer it and return it back to the government.

Some people have reported receiving a very well printed, official looking document that purported to ask questions that one would expect to find on the census. It involved multiple pages with many questions. But the troubling questions (ten questions in fact) involved asking for an individual's (& spouse's) MEDICARE numbers. THE CENSUS TAKERS WILL NEVER ASK FOR YOUR MEDICARE NUMBER. Other government officials might ask about your medical care or your insurance, but even they will not ask for your policy numbers. <u>Census Bureau surveys will **not** ask for a full social security number, credit card numbers, any information on behalf of political parties and especially, will not ever ask you to send money!</u>

If you ever have doubts about questions on the census or the validity of your document, the Bureau wants you to ask them. First check: does your document have a return address from Jeffersonville, Indiana and does it bear the US Department of Commerce or the US Census Bureau name as the agency.

Besides the census, the Bureau conducts other official surveys every year for just randomly selected people. You can always go to **census.gov** and click on "Help for Survey Participants." If you still have doubts you may call **1-800-523-3205** for the National Processing Center. If you feel you have received a fraudulent document, do email and report it at: <u>ois.fraud.reporting@census.gov</u>


