



Texas is home to several large Genealogical Collections. Dallas has their superb downtown library. Locally, FW has their new FW History Center while Arlington, Grapevine, & Grand Prairie all have very good collections. Across the state, Austin has a large Public Library collection as well as the State Library and Archives too. Houston has the fabulous Clayton Library. San Antonio has several large libraries and collections

including SA Public, the DRT Library, and the San Antonio Genealogical & Historical Society Library. Summer is a great time to travel and do some research while you explore these great treasures.

Summer tip is to call ahead to make sure of days and hours open. Since the Pandemic some rules have changed too.



Spotlight on....

Franklin County Genealogical Society Mount Vernon, Texas

If you have people to research in that area, it might be worth a visit to the town square of Mount Vernon, TX. The **FCGS** mans two store fronts there. The main one is dedicated to research for genealogical purposes and the other is a meeting space. The FCGS library is a wonderland of maps, family files, books, land records, probates and many other articles pertaining to the settlers of Franklin County, Texas. Several years ago, FCGS was gifted with land abstracts in file folders and they have begun to digitize 6000 already. They are searchable. In addition to all this, they have a browsable library of works on Texas and other states. Patrons can also access Ancestry, Fold3, Newspapers.com and Family Search if they bring their own device. Of note, is their family surname files, some being added from the digitized land records.

The society also sponsers a "Franklin County First Family" program for those who can document their direct ancestors who settled in what is now Franklin County by 1880. Those lineages provide a wealth of added information in tracing families.

Besides Franklin county records they have acquired the records and research materials from Titus county and have materials on Hopkins county as well.

Check out their website below and if in the area stop in for a research visit. They do take research requests for look ups.
